## STANDING UP



An Election Guide for Women wishing to stand for Local Government in WA







### **OVERVIEW**

When women are involved in politics, society is more equitable and democracy is both strengthened and enhanced. However, women continue to be underrepresented at all levels of political leadership, including Local Government. In WA, the average representation of women elected to Local Government Councils is 38%

The greatest obstacles to women's entry into politics include prejudice and cultural perceptions about the role of women, together with a lack of financial resources.

The Standing Up program aims to increase the number of women elected to Local Governments in Western Australia by:

- Empowering more local women to stand for election
- · Providing election campaigning advice
- Enabling networking opportunities with other women currently elected in Local Government
- · Providing support during their campaigns

Achieving gender equity in politics will not happen unless women are encouraged to stand and are supported through their campaigning journeys.

## WHY SHOULD YOU RUN FOR COUNCIL?

Running for Council is a great way to represent your community and make changes in your local area.

Councils make a lot of decisions on a wide range of items about your suburb or town. Representatives from the community are elected to Councils to help make these decisions, so it is important that all voices are heard.

### **ALLOWANCES**

Did you know that Elected Members can be reimbursed for their telephone, travel and child care expenses when relating to their attendance at Council meetings?

Some Councils will even pay an annual allowance to cover some of these reimbursements to lessen the burden on Elected Members.

This is in addition to the Elected Members sitting fee.

- Are you over 18 years old?
- Are you enrolled as an elector?
- Have you previously been bankrupt or insolvent?

## RESEARCH THE ROLE

1 Attend Council Meetings
Understand Council meeting processes

Talk to other Elected

Members

Get to know the team

Read the agenda

See what Council discusses

Ask questions from the gallery

Use public question time

## **SET A STRATEGY**

- Voting is voluntary, so you need to encourage and inspire people to vote
- Pick which communication methods you will use to connect with voters door knocking, letterboxing, phone calling etc
- Have a clear, consistent message





- Work out how many votes you need to win
- Work out how many flyers, posters and signs you will need
- Research advertising rates
- Call family and friends for donations
- Hold a fundraising launch party
- Claim \$1,000 campaign expenses as a tax deduction



# DEFINE YOUR PURPOSE AND POSITION

- What issues drive you?
- What do you want to achieve?

What are your 3 key messages?

## PERSONALISE YOUR CAMPAIGN

- Tell your story who are you?
- Be authentic why should people vote for you?
- Authorise everything you say or materials you put out.



## **BRANDING**

- Professional Photos take some professional photos in easily identifiable places
- Colour scheme pick a neutral colour scheme that is non politically aligned
- Graphic Design use free programs such as Canva to create your campaign flyers, business cards, social media tiles, ads etc.







## **CHECK EVERYTHING!**

#### **SOCIAL MEDIA CLEAN UP**

Untag, unlike, and delete anything that could be seen as inappropriate

#### **PERSONAL DETAILS**

How much personal information do you want to give out? Email? Phone number?

## **NETWORKING**

- Connect with local residents by attending regular meetings of sports clubs, community associations and school P&Cs
- Join the local Chamber of Commerce and attend their upcoming networking event to connect with local Businesses
- Attend candidate training sessions





## **HOW TO NOMINATE**

- Complete a nomination form
- Prepare a candidates statement (150 words) saying why people should vote for you
- Get a professional photo done for the candidate statement
- Pay \$80 to the electoral officer
- Book an appointment with the electoral officer



## TIMELINE...

Keep track of key dates - www.elections.wa.gov.au

## NOMINATION OPENS

First day you can submit your nomination to the returning officer

## NOMINATION CLOSES

Last day you can submit your nomination to the returning officer

#### VOTING PACKS DELIVERED

Date that voting packs are delivered by Australia Post

#### VOTING RETURNS LOG

Keep tracking how many votes have been returned per area

#### **ELECTION DAY**

Polls close and counting begins. Make sure you nominate a scruitineer

## **ACHIEVING RESULTS**

The more time and effort you put into your election campaign, the more successful it is likely to be.

Follow up voters, check that people you know or have contacted have voted, ask them to check their family, friends and neighbours have also voted.



## YOU'VE GOT THIS...

- Research the role
- Define your purpose
- Set your budget
- Clear, consistent messaging
- Network as much as possible
- Call people to check they have voted
- More effort you put in, the more likely you're voted in
